

Our Charter



Ipswich & West Moreton is a distinctive region that requires a tailored approach to set regional priorities within a strategic framework. RDAIWM will concentrate on several key areas: economic development, workforce and skills enhancement, social and community growth, and environmental sustainability. We prioritise investments in regional infrastructure, improved connectivity, and the **promotion of industry growth to support local businesses in Ipswich, Lockyer Valley, Scenic Rim, and Somerset**.

We are dedicated to strengthening our local workforce and job markets through initiatives like the Springfield Regional Jobs Committee and the Jobs Portal for Ipswich, Lockyer Valley, Scenic Rim, and Somerset. Our aim is to foster local leadership, align workforce skills with employer needs, and provide targeted support for youth and First Nations communities.

As part of our long-term commitment to improving opportunities for our diverse population, we are promoting micro-credentialing programs and cybersecurity training for small businesses. Enhancing regional connectivity is crucial for ensuring our community keeps pace with the national economy. 

3. Local Jobs Program (Wivenhoe)

Promoting workforce development and economic growth.

The Local Jobs Program Wivenhoe is an initiative **designed to connect businesses and community organisations** with individuals seeking training, jobs, and support services. By addressing local workforce needs and supporting businesses, **this program aims to enhance economic development** in Wivenhoe and, more broadly, the Ipswich & West Moreton region.

Project Overview

The Workforce Australia Local Jobs (Local Jobs) program supports tailored approaches to accelerate reskilling, upskilling, and employment pathways. It responds to current and emerging local workforce needs, promoting a collaborative environment between businesses, community organisations, and jobseekers.

Key Objectives

- Better prepare the Wivenhoe Employment region's long-term unemployment caseload to meet industry entry-level job requirements.
- Address the mismatch between the skills of the available workforce and employer/industry requirements.
- Collaborate with industry and Employment Service Providers t enhance the potential of youth, culturally diverse and First Nations people to maximise opportunities available in the current labour market.
- Address transportation challenges that hinder access to employment.
- Encourage and retain engagement in apprenticeships and traineeships.

Identified Sites

The Workforce Australia region of Wivenhoe includes:

- Brisbane West
- Ipswich
- Lockyer Valley (Laidley region)
- Scenic Rim (Boonah region)
- Somerset (Esk region)



Economic Development

The project supports several major construction projects in the Employment Region, such as the Gatton Jail, Ipswich Mental Health facility, Inland Rail, and the 2032 Olympic Games. These projects have a social impact on employment commitments that must be met, driving economic development and job creation.

Environmental Impact

Transporting the workforce within the Employment Region poses challenges, particularly for farm-based and food-processing jobs. The local unemployed workforce in agricultural areas cannot meet the demand, and potential workers from major population centres in Ipswich find it challenging to travel to these jobs.

Community Engagement

In Wivenhoe, 70% of the long-term unemployed have been jobless for over two years. This impacts their confidence, motivation, resilience, and fitness. Enhancing these soft skills and physical fitness is crucial, enabling individuals to meet industry entry-level job requirements and secure employment.

Addressing Challenges

The program brings local businesses, community organisations, and key stakeholders together to develop local skills and employment solutions. It supports businesses in meeting their current and future workforce needs and connects individuals to training, support services, and employment opportunities in their local region.

Collaborative Partnerships

Each Employment Region has a Local Jobs and Skills Taskforce, chaired by an Employment Facilitator. Taskforce members work collaboratively to develop local solutions to help people gain the right skills to get a job and assist employers with their workforce needs.

Economic and Social Impact

There is a shortage of skilled labour and tradespeople in the manufacturing and construction industries in the Employment Region. While some employers are now prepared to consider trades assistants and labourers, job-specific pre-employment preparation remains necessary.

Governance and Management

Taskforces comprise key local stakeholders representing their community and the priorities in the Local Jobs Plan. Limited to 10 members to remain small and action-oriented, membership is reviewed at least every six months to ensure the Taskforce remains relevant and agile. Membership is voluntary and unpaid.

Community Engagement and Education

Employment Facilitators and Support Officers support the program's delivery by bringing together key stakeholders, including businesses, employment service providers, and higher education and training organisations.

Conclusion

The Local Jobs Program is a collaborative initiative to improve local labour markets for all Australians through partnerships with businesses and communities. Taskforce members meet regularly to understand their region and use their contacts and knowledge to impact the local employment landscape. Volunteers help connect local people with quality jobs, improve skills, and assist employers in meeting their workforce needs.

4. Regional Energy Transition Collaborative

Somerset significantly contributes to meat production and processing and houses key water catchments for Southeast Queensland.
